The information we have is dated however law enforcement across the country acknowledges that the non recovery problem has grown and in some areas is around 60% 70% or worse. An example would be Vancouver lower mainland. Traditional recovery rate there have been 95%. They have been very successful in reduce auto theft rate by around 20%. But the un-recovered rate has dropped to 85%.
